


# Army Song

## Thomas S. McCarthy

Battalion Commander  
Battalion 7, FDNY



Thomas S. McCarthy is a 31-year veteran of the New York City Fire Department. He assumed his duties and current position as Battalion Commander, Battalion 7, New York City Fire Department in May 2003. As such, he oversees four Engine Companies and more than 140 firefighters, 21 lieutenants, and seven captains.

McCarthy joined the department in November 1980, serving the Brownsville Community with Engine Company 232 in Brooklyn. Following his initial tour of duty, McCarthy served with Ladder Company 176, which also served the Brownsville Community in Brooklyn. In 1988, he was promoted to the rank of lieutenant and re-assigned to South Bronx's, 6th Division. McCarthy was promoted to the rank of captain in 1992 and served with Ladder Company 12 in Manhattan. Ladder 12 is where he served with Michael D. Mullan and responded following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

McCarthy is a recent graduate of the Columbia University's Picker Center for Executive Education's Fire Officers Management Institute course, a six-month curriculum that offers leadership, critical thinking and a variety of emergency management, homeland security and community response protocols.

## Congressman Bobby Scott



Congressman Bobby Scott was born on April 30, 1947 in Washington, D.C. and grew up in Newport News, Virginia. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Boston College Law School. After graduating from law school, he returned to Newport News and practiced law from 1973 to 1991. He received an honorable discharge for his service in the Massachusetts National Guard and the United States Army Reserve.

Rep. Scott began serving his tenth term as a Member of Congress on January 5, 2011. Prior to serving in the U.S. House of Representatives, Scott served in the Virginia House of Delegates from 1978 to 1983 and in the Senate of Virginia from 1983 to 1993.

In November 1992, Rep. Scott was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. Through this election, he made history by becoming the first African American elected to Congress from the Commonwealth of Virginia since Reconstruction and only the second African American elected to Congress in Virginia's history.

From the beginning of his tenure in Congress, Rep. Scott has led efforts to pass comprehensive juvenile justice reform and crime prevention legislation. He is also leading efforts to enact legislation designed to reduce high school dropout rates and increase access to a college education for all students with the Every Student Counts Act.

Rep. Scott is a strong supporter of our nation's military readiness as well as our troops and their safety. He is a leading advocate for improving and increasing funding for veterans' benefits and health care, especially mental health care, and was the lead sponsor in the House of Senator Jim Webb's Post-9/11 G.I. Bill that was signed into law on June 30, 2008. For the 111th Congress, he received an "A" from the Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America for his service and commitment to veterans.

## Citation

Today we gather to dedicate MULLAN HALL, Building 1504, Joint Task Force Civil Support, Joint Base Langley Eustis, Newport News, Virginia, in memory of CPT Michael Dermott Mullan, a U.S. Army Reserve Soldier, emergency room nurse, and decorated New York City firefighter cited for bravery. During the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks in New York, CPT Mullan gave his life rescuing civilians and firefighters trapped inside the Marriott Hotel, adjacent to the North and South Towers of the World Trade Center. CPT Mullan's heroics were part of a pivotal event in our history that resulted in the creation of the Department of Homeland Security and changed the landscape of disaster preparedness and civil support. This brave Soldier was dedicated to saving lives, and the Joint Task Force Civil Support mission continues that commitment every day. CPT Mullan served honorably in the U.S. Army for 15 years and distinguished himself in service to the New York City Fire Department for seven years. CPT Mullan embodied the core principles and life-saving spirit of Joint Task Force Civil Support.



Major General Jonathan T. Treacy is the Commander for Joint Task Force Civil Support, United States Northern Command, Joint Base Langley Eustis, Virginia. Joint Task Force Civil Support is a joint headquarters comprised of over 200 military and civilian personnel, which plans and integrates Department of Defense support to the Primary Agency for domestic chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear consequence management operations. When directed, Joint Task Force Civil Support deploys and executes timely and effective command and control of over 5,000 Department of Defense personnel, providing critical life-saving and life sustaining support to civil authorities as well as fostering community recovery.

MG Treacy was commissioned in 1980 as a second lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps, through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N. Y. After initial assignment as an advanced jet flight instructor, he joined Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 323 where in 1986 he participated in combat operations off the coast of Libya, including Operation ELDORADO CANYON. In 1988, MG Treacy joined the 102nd Fighter Interceptor Wing, Otis Air National Guard Base, Massachusetts Air National Guard, where he held numerous positions including command of 102nd Operations Support Flight, 101st Fighter Squadron and 101st Expeditionary Fighter Squadron. There he led the squadron through two combat deployments to Southwest Asia, Operations NORTHERN and SOUTHERN WATCH, as well as the initial air defense force response to the terrorist attacks on New York City on September 11, 2001. Prior to his current assignment, MG Treacy served as the Director Air National Guard Forces, Air Combat Command; the Assistant Adjutant General, Hawaii Air National Guard; and most recently as the Deputy Director for Antiterrorism and Homeland Defense, J-34, the Joint Staff. He is a command pilot with 189 arrested landings and more than 3,300 flying hours primarily in the F/A-18 and F-15.

**Captain Michael Dermott Mullan**



Captain Michael Dermott Mullan was born on April 6, 1967. Mullan was a U.S. Army Reserve nurse with the 344th Combat Support Hospital and an emergency room nurse at Mercy Medical Center, New York. He was also a New York City firefighter assigned to Ladder 12.

CPT Mullan served 15 years in the U.S. Army Reserve, first enlisting as a combat medic, then serving as a commissioned officer and nurse. He also served over seven years as a New York City firefighter.

CPT Mullan died in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, while on duty as a firefighter with Ladder 12. On that day, CPT Mullan responded to the Marriott Hotel to rescue civilians and other emergency workers trapped in the hotel. He reached the 19th floor of the hotel and was assisting victims to lower floors when the first of the two towers fell, blowing out windows and doors of the hotel and knocking firefighters down the stairwells. As the order was given to evacuate the hotel, CPT Mullan heard a distress call from two other firefighters on floors above him. Instead of evacuating immediately, he courageously volunteered to rescue his fellow firefighters. Soon after that decision, the second tower fell and tore off most of the face of the hotel, exposing the stairwell to the outside. CPT Mullan was one of four firefighters from Ladder 12 who did not escape the building that day.

Joint Task Force Civil Support was recently relocated to Joint Base Langley Eustis, Virginia. The dedication of this new facility memorializes CPT Mullan's courageous acts and highlights the criticality of training and planning for civil support to CBRN attacks. This capability serves both as a deterrent to our adversaries and as reinforcement to homeland security and disaster preparedness agencies.

CPT Mullan is survived by his mother, Theresa, his father Patrick (deceased), his sister, Kelly-Ann and brother, Patrick.
